

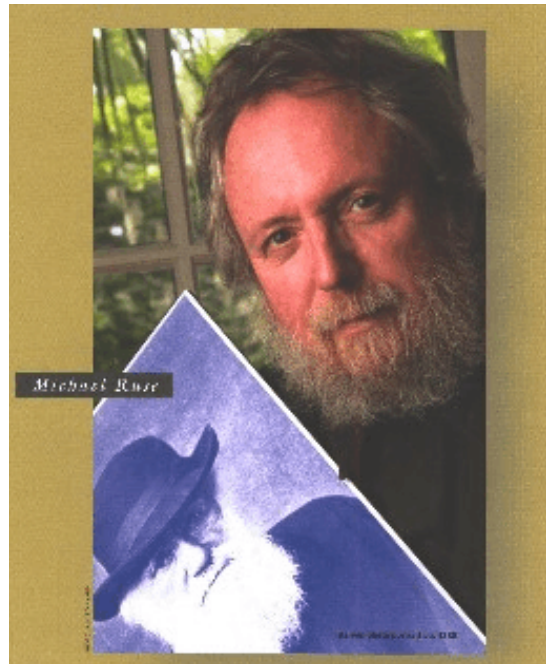
The Creighton University Department of Philosophy Presents the Twenty-Sixth

Change and the Victorians: Charles Darwin and John Henry Newman

The 19th century was the time when people had to grapple with the realization that the world both physical and cultural is one of constant change. This talk compares and contrasts two great Victorian thinkers--the biologist and naturalist Charles Darwin and the Anglican-turned-Catholic theologian John Henry Newman--for whom such change was a major challenge and stimulus.

Michael Ruse

Michael Ruse is the Lucyle T. Werkmeister Professor of Philosophy at Florida State University. He holds a joint appointment in philosophy and zoology. A native of England, Dr. Ruse received his Ph.D. from the University of Bristol. He taught at the University of Guelph, Ontario, until 2000, when he took the present chair. Dr. Ruse has written some 24 books, including the recent *Darwin and Design* (2003) and *The Evolution-Creation Struggle* (2005). He has been a visiting scholar at Cambridge University and at the Harvard University Museum of Comparative Zoology.
